



#### 'Sailing' Named the New National Sport of The Bahamas









The Bahamas has named sailing as its new national sport, replacing cricket, as announced in the House of Assembly on April 12, 2023. Agriculture, Marine Resources, and Family Island Affairs Minister Clay Sweeting moved the resolution and expressed his excitement for the long-awaited announcement.

"We have witnessed its evolution, and it is a sport that has won the hearts of Bahamians and the millions of visitors to The Bahamas. It is a sport that subtly reminds us of who we are – a friendly, maritime people that continues to make waves internationally by sailing with vigor and grace – the underpinnings of the Bahamian spirit," said Sweeting.

Sweeting highlighted that sailing is a sport that reminds Bahamians of their identity as maritime people, and

it has won the hearts of both locals and visitors. He also emphasized that sailing has been a part of Bahamian culture for centuries, from the work boats to meticulously crafted sloop race boats and the first regatta, held in Exuma in 1943.

The sport of sailing has grown in strength over the past decades and has become an essential economic drive for the Family Islands. The Family Islands, also known as the Out Islands, are a group of islands in The located outside Bahamas densely populated, New Providence and Grand Bahama. Family Islands consist of popular destinations such as Eleuthera, Exuma, Abaco, Andros, and the Berry Islands. The islands are known for their natural beauty, pristine beaches, and diverse marine life, making them popular tourist destinations for those seeking a more

relaxed and secluded experience.

Currently, there are 18 senior regattas and 17 junior sailing events held annually throughout The Bahamas. Minister Sweeting also acknowledged several sailing athletes, including Rolly Gray and Edgar Moxey. The former Minister of Agriculture and Marine Resources, now leader of the opposition, Michael Pintard, supported the appointment of the new national sport.

Sailing is vibrant in The Bahamas, and the move to recognize it as the new national sport is a way to acknowledge the legacy of the sport while promoting its development.

Sailing has officially became the national sport of The Bahamas on April 12<sup>th</sup>, 2023.
